

Boston College Law School will host the event Civic Engagement in an "Equality Recession" on March 18 at 4:30 pm. The event will take place in the East Wing Building, Room 120. It is free and open to the public.

#### **Event Description**

This past calendar year has marked a variety of milestones with regard to equality in the U.S., including, but not limited to, the 60th year anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education, a landmark case prohibiting segregation in public schools, the 50th year anniversary of the Voting Rights Act, legislation that prohibits racial discrimination with regard to voting practices and the 30th year anniversary of the Black Alumni Network (BAN) of Boston College Law

The primary purpose of Civic Engagement in an "Equality Recession" is to celebrate these great achievements, and to have an honest dialogue about the work that remains. Panelists will propose tangible action items that emerging leaders, educators and practitioners can utilize in the ongoing fight for justice and equality.

"Equality recession" is a term coined by the two student event organizers to discuss the current state of affairs in a society marked by advancements in equality with regard to race, followed

by significant reductions after a peak has been reached. "Although there have been significant strides overall since the 1960's, equality in the U.S. has regressed since its recent peaks," said Alvin Reynolds, a third-year student and co-organizer along with second-year student Taisha Sturdivant. "This is similar to the way our economy works. Prominent examples of the recessive behavior with regard to equality include mass incarceration issues, income inequality, education inequality, employment inequality and the recent instances of tension between police forces and minority groups around the U.S."
